POSTGAME NOTES AFC DIVISIONAL GAME Jan. 23, 2022

CHIEFS EXTEND HOME PLAYOFF WINNING STREAK IN OVERTIME: With tonight's 42-36 overtime victory, the Chiefs have won six consecutive playoff games at GEHA Field at Arrowhead Stadium, extending the club's franchise record and tying for the 10th-longest home playoff winning streak in NFL history, dating back to the 1970 merger. It is currently the longest active postseason home winning streak in the NFL. The club has now qualified for the AFC Championship Game for the fourth-consecutive season, extending a franchise record and becoming just the seventh team in NFL history to play in at least four consecutive conference championship games. With Cincinnati's win vs. Tennessee yesterday and Kansas City's win today, the Chiefs become the first team in NFL history to host four consecutive conference championship games. The Chiefs had been tied with the 2002-04 Philadelphia Eagles (also coached by Head Coach Andy Reid) for the longest streak of consecutive home conference title games with three (2018-20). The club has now played in five overtime games in the postseason, going 3-2 (.600) in those contests.

REID TIES SHULA ON WIN CHART: With tonight's win, Head Coach Andy Reid tallied his 19th career postseason victory, tying PFHOF coach Don Shula (19) for the third-most career postseason wins by a head coach in NFL history. He now trails PFHOF coach Tom Landry (20) by one victory for a share of second place on the all-time list. Reid extended his franchise record for postseason wins by a head coach to nine with the victory, now owning more victories than the next two coaches in franchise history combined. He has 252 overall wins (regular and postseason) in his career, the fifth-most career wins by a head coach in NFL history. By advancing to a fourth consecutive AFC Championship Game with the Chiefs, Reid becomes the only coach in NFL history to reach four consecutive conference championship games two different times in his career, also earning four straight trips to the NFC Championship Game from 2001-04 as head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles.

MAHOMES SHINES IN AIR AND ON GROUND: QB Patrick Mahomes finished tonight's game completing 33 of 44 passes (75.0%) for 378 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions, good for a 123.1 passer rating. His 33 completions are the most in a single postseason game in franchise history, his 44 attempts are the fourth most in a single postseason game in franchise history and his 75.0 completion percentage is the fourth-best single-game mark in franchise postseason history. His 378 passing yards tie for the second-most in a single game in franchise postseason history.

Mahomes added seven carries for a game-high 69 yards (9.9 avg.) and added an eight-yard touchdown rush. His 69 rushing yards are the most by a quarterback in a single postseason game in franchise history. Mahomes now owns 305 career postseason rushing yards, extending his franchise record for a quarterback. His 305 career rushing yards in the postseason rank as the third-most by any player in franchise history. It marks Mahomes' fourth career postseason game with both a rushing and a passing touchdown. Per ESPN Stats and Info, Mahomes is now tied for the third-most such games in NFL postseason history, trailing only Steve Young (seven) and Tom Brady (five). He's tied with John Elway and Donovan McNabb.

HILL HAULS IN 100-PLUS IN WIN, CROSSES 1,000 YARDS FOR POSTSEASON CAREER: WR Tyreek Hill caught 11 passes for 150 yards (13.6 avg.) with a 64-yard touchdown in the game. His 11 receptions are the second-most by a player in a single postseason game in franchise history. His 150 receiving yards are tied for the second-most in a single-postseason game, and his 64-yard touchdown reception is the third-longest scoring reception in the postseason in franchise history. He now owns four career 100-yard receiving games in the postseason, the second-most in franchise history behind only TE Travis Kelce (seven). Hill owns 77 career receptions in the postseason and has 1,003 receiving yards. Both his reception and receiving yards totals are the second-most in franchise history behind only Kelce. He now has four career receiving touchdowns in the postseason and has five total postseason touchdowns, tying for second-most in receiving touchdowns and tying for third-most total touchdowns in franchise history, respectively.

With 1,003 career receiving yards in the postseason, Hill joins an exclusive list of players to eclipse the 1,000-yard receiving mark in their postseason career. He becomes the 17th overall player to record at least 1,000 career receiving yards in the postseason and his 1,003 yards rank 16th all-time. He joins teammate TE Travis Kelce (1,196) as the second player in franchise history to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark for a career. Kelce now moved into eighth place for most career receiving yards in NFL history. Only five franchises in NFL history currently have two players with more than 1,000 career postseason receiving yards -- Dallas (Michael Irvin and Drew Pearson), New England (Julian Edelman and Rob Gronkowski), Oakland (Cliff Branch and Fred Biletnikoff), Pittsburgh (Hines Ward and John Stallworth) and Kansas City (Travis Kelce and Tyreek Hill). Of the five teams with two 1,000-yard receivers in their history, only three pairs were ever teammates at the same time – Edelman and Gronkowski in New England, Branch and Biletnikoff in Oakland and Kelce and Hill in Kansas City.

KELCE CONTINUES ASCENSION IN POSTSEASON RECEIVING CHARTS: TE Travis Kelce caught eight passes for 96 yards (12.0 avg.) and added the game-winning eight-yard touchdown reception in overtime. Kelce extends his franchise record to 96 postseason receptions, which ranks as the fourth-most by a single player in in their postseason career in NFL history. He trails only Rob Gronkowski (98) for most receptions by a tight end in NFL postseason history. He needs four receptions to become just the third player in NFL history to record 100 career postseason receptions.

CHIEFS AWARDED INTERNATIONAL MARKETING RIGHTS FOR GERMANY AND MEXICO AS PART OF NFL'S GLOBAL GROWTH

KANSAS CITY, Mo. – The National Football League announced today that the Chiefs have been awarded International Home Marketing Area (IHMA) rights for Germany and Mexico as part of the global growth of professional football.

"We are thrilled with the league's announcement today that the Chiefs have secured the international marketing rights to both Germany and Mexico," Chiefs Chairman and CEO Clark Hunt said. "My father, Lamar, founded the Chiefs and the American Football League in 1960 to introduce pro football to new fans in new regions of the country. Over the last three decades, the Chiefs have been at the forefront of the NFL's global growth initiatives – building on the legacy of our founder to bring America's game to new fans in new places. We look forward to building relationships with fans in Germany and Mexico and continuing to share the best of Chiefs Kingdom around the world."

"We are currently enjoying the most successful period in franchise history, with some of the top players and coaches on the field as well as the support of a talented and dedicated business operations staff, and we believe we are uniquely positioned to be a leader in the NFL's global growth," Chiefs President Mark Donovan said. "We have an internal committee which has been leading our international efforts for multiple years and today's announcement not only recognizes the hard work that went into this bid process, but it also signals the start of an exciting challenge for our team and opportunity for our fan base in the coming years."

Beginning on Jan. 1, 2022, the club can start activating elements of its marketing plans in both countries, including posting on new localized Chiefs social media channels to engage fans, unveiling market/language-specific digital properties (Chiefs.com and Chiefs Mobile app), beginning paid advertising campaigns, signing local sponsorship deals, extending domestic sponsors internationally and aligning with local agencies with on-the-ground knowledge and expertise.

Longer-term, the club will invest in growing its fanbase in both markets through on-site activations and fan events, supporting and growing local youth FLAG Football participation, launching local merchandise sales initiatives, establishing partnerships with existing fan clubs, creating local community and social initiatives as well as exploring opportunities to play regular season games in the markets as part of the NFL's new rotation of International Series games.

The Chiefs and the Hunt family have been involved in numerous international initiatives over the past three decades, investing in growing the game and its fanbase globally and helping showcase the best of the sport on the international stage. The club previously appeared in four American Bowl preseason contests – Berlin, Germany (1990), Tokyo, Japan (1994 and 1998) and Monterrey, Mexico (1996). Over the past seven years the club has played in two International Series regular season games, hosting the Detroit Lions at London's Wembley Stadium in 2015 and taking on the Los Angeles Chargers at Mexico City's Estadio Azteca in 2019.

In addition to international contests, Chiefs Chairman and CEO Clark Hunt sits on the NFL's International Committee, having served as Chairman from 2011-18, advocating for the expansion of the league's international efforts and NFL's footprint overseas. Through the 2021 season, 31 teams have played a total of 30 regular season games in London, while the league has hosted three regular season games in Mexico since 2016. In addition, Chiefs Cheerleaders and KC Wolf have visited more than 60 military installations around the world to show support for the men and women serving overseas and the club also has more than 15,000 youth already participating in Chiefs FLAG Football leagues in both Mexico and France.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. – The Kansas City Chiefs will continue their postseason run with an AFC Championship matchup against the Cincinnati Bengals at GEHA Field at Arrowhead Stadium on Sunday, January 30.

Stadium Health and Safety

With the expiration of the KCMO mask ordinance, masks are no longer required in indoor spaces. However, per the KCMO Health Department recommendation, masks are encouraged. Game Entertainment

Grammy Award-winning singer-songwriter, actor and author Ashanti will sing the national anthem while the Fort Leonard Wood Joint Services Color Guard will present the colors, followed by a flyover of four A-10 Thunderbolts from Whiteman Air Force Base in Knob Noster, Missouri. The honorary coin toss captain will be former Chiefs Pro Football Hall of Fame guard Will Shields.

Parking and Traffic

Fans are reminded that parking and tailgating in stadium-controlled lots is for ticketed guests only and tailgating is prohibited during the game. The club reserves the right to confirm that guests have tickets prior to allowing them into parking lots. Parking lots for Sunday's game open at 9:30 a.m. All parking passes must be purchased in advance at www.chiefs.com/stadium/parking/ as payments will not be accepted at the parking tollgates. To help celebrate the franchise's 60th season in 2019, the Kansas City Chiefs introduced the Lamar Hunt Legacy seat at GEHA Field at Arrowhead Stadium.
